



It has been 10 years since the Central Valley Farmland Trust commenced operations out of its modest office in Elk Grove. From this humble yet determined beginning, the organization has blossomed over the years. Through the collective efforts of its numerous volunteers, board of directors, and staff, CVFT now boasts over 13,000 acres of valuable farmland protected in the central San Joaquin Valley. During this most recent fiscal year an additional two farms totaling approximately 325 acres in Sacramento and San Joaquin counties were protected with agricultural conservation easements.

To the untrained eye, what CVFT does may appear simple. Find a landowner who is voluntarily willing to place an ag conservation easement (ACE) on his or her farm, agree to pay them to do so, and close the deal. To put it in perspective, CVFT has averaged 2.6 ACEs per year over the last 10 years. By anybody's gauge that may not seem like much productivity. Now let's add additional metrics to the mix:

- 1. Finding a willing landowner can take 1-2 years or longer in some greas
- 2. Determining the land meets CVFT selection criteria guidelines can eliminate up to 50% of prospective projects
- 3. Meetings with the landowner(s) are necessary to ensure a full understanding of the implications of something (e.g., ACE) which impacts the land in perpetuity
- 4. The necessary legal documentation is complicated and CVFT strongly suggests the landowner(s) retain qualified legal and tax counsel
- Title, mineral rights, and or mortgage debt issues may negatively impact the ability to close a project
- 6. Funding to pay for ACEs is dynamic depending on the county and is non-existent in some areas
- 7. If agency funding is involved (e.g., which is typical) add an additional 6-9 months to the process
- 8. Given all the above, the process once started in earnest can take up to 18-24 months to close

While a lot of ongoing effort goes into the ACE process, CVFT is also ever vigilant in managing the administrative side of the business. Let's not forget that CVFT is a non-profit public benefit entity and is beholden to everyone who generously donates time and resources to assist in the farmland conservation effort, Without their collective support CVFT would not be what it has become.

CVFT must adhere to the highest professional standards in everything it does. During the fiscal year CVFT went through the onerous process of applying for renewal of its accreditation status, which was granted on February 21, 2014. To ensure adherence to the highest financial fiduciary responsibility, the board made the conscious decision to move to a new investment advisor. Most importantly, CVFT ended the year in its strongest financial condition since inception.

CVFT's board and staff are very proud of where this organization has come from and where it is headed. But it can never be overemphasized that without the generous support of our volunteers, corporate sponsors, and members, CVFT may not have been in existence today. Please continue your support to ensure we protect "20,000 by 2020."



This spectacular family farm lies within CVFT's strategic ag conservation easement priority area and is within one mile of another easement on this family's property.








NUMBERS AND SENSE FINANCIALS

For fiscal year 2013/14 we are very pleased to report that our conservation easement program activities resulted in the closing of two agricultural conservation easements (ACEs) totaling 324 acres in Sacramento & San Joaquin counties. Our net assets increased from \$1,034,651 to \$1,149,712. Operating expenses increased from \$337,758 to \$437,225. This was due mainly to the increase in program costs to close two ACEs, versus one ACE in the prior year. Additionally, there was an increase in the ongoing cost of delivering higher quality communications and outreach. However, operating income exceeded expenses by \$27,851. At fiscal year-end we held approximately \$3.0 million in mitigation fees received from various municipalities where we have agreements to facilitate their respective farmland mitigation programs. These funds are combined with other funding sources to complete conservation easement acquisitions (*See *Reallocation of Mitigation Fees* below) and cover certain program transactional costs. Of the total \$1,744,200 conservation easement acquisition amount, \$1,578,900 was from acquisition grants from the US Natural Resources Conservation Service, California Department of Conservation, and the City of Elk Grove.


