

YEAR IN REVIEW

Dear Friends,

As we present California Farmland Trust's (CFT) 2019 Annual Report, I am pleased to share that it was a progressive year of growth.

In 2019, CFT permanently protected nine properties, totaling 705 acres throughout the Central Valley, bringing our combined total to 16,643 acres. To celebrate, we held an event in the fall on a sweet potato farm, right in the middle of harvest. A true celebration with landowners, supporters, dignitaries, and partners, to witness firsthand the reason we are committed to protecting this valuable natural resource. At the end of 2019, we were awarded funds to protect an additional 645 acres on four properties. We look forward to sharing more about these projects as they progress.



Our board and staff also grew and evolved. We bid farewell to board member Tim Byrd. Tim was a founding board member and past president of the land trust that is now CFT. Tim brought extensive expertise and dedication to the organization and will be missed. Joining the board, was Sam Zanutto and Tom Rogers. Sam is the Associate General Counsel for American AgCredit and grew up on a farm in Atwater. Tom is a third-generation farmer and farms almonds in Madera County. Both, Sam and Tom bring valuable experience and commitment to CFT's mission. We also welcomed two new staff members to the team. Chelsea Molina joined CFT in the spring and is serving as the Conservation Director. Katie Otto joined us in December as the Development and Operations Director. Both bring significant professional expertise and a strong passion for agriculture that will be instrumental in moving CFT's mission forward. Finally, joining our Trustee Council was Ann Veneman. As former United States Secretary of Agriculture, she brings experience that will help guide the organization to the next level.



The importance of protecting farmland was captured in a wonderful and telling documentary featuring one of our easement holders and Merced County farmer, Jean Okuye. *Concrete California* emphasizes that development on farmland is truly a one-time harvest. In addition, we continued to grow our educational and outreach efforts. Thanks to a partnership with Raley's, our Field Trips to the Farm program hosted eight classes of fourth and fifth grade students. Students learned about farming practices, vermicompost, livestock, planting, produce preparation and more. Each class was also treated to lunch and a behind-the-scenes tour of a Raley's supermarket.

2019 was a rewarding year and we are grateful to everyone who has helped our mission grow and thrive. That said, it is important to acknowledge our reality at this time of the publication. I could have never anticipated how 2020 would evolve as it pertains to COVID-19. It is still too soon to tell the lasting impact this will have. Empty supermarket shelves maybe a glimpse into the future of the supply and demand challenges we will face if the population grows and farmland is not protected. Through it all, our staff, board members, landowners and our supporters have rallied to ensure our work continues. Our current easement projects and prospect list continues to grow, as does the scope of our efforts. *We are essential every day and appreciate your support*.



During the 2019 year, CFT protected 705 acres of farmland with an easement value of approximately \$6,500,000. The functional percentage considers the inclusion of the conservation easement value acquired during the year.
